## GO AGAIN!







Prom goers danced the night away, especially to the Prom songs "A Whole New World" and "The Right Kind of Love." Music was provided by Music in Motion (Z-100).





They also attended a musical workshop at Washington University. And las but not least shopping, these were just a few of the things that they did down there.





#### Issue of sexual harassment is discussed at Colby by Niaomi Runge

Any one who has walked the Senior High halls has seen it. Some of us may have been the victim of it. Some of us may have provoked it. Most of us don't fully understand it. The "it" is sexual harassment.

The term is so new that Webster has not defined it yet. The term may be new, but actual acts of sexual harassment date back to cavemen days. Sexual harassment started to get noticed for what it actually was back tn the '60's. It became apparent as women came on equal terms with men in the workplace, and men's insecurities started to shine through. Sexual harassment caught everyone's attention in the 1991 court case of Anita Hill and Clarence Thomas. Don't feel sexual harassment is just a women's issue; men also fall victim, but do not report it nearly as much.

You may ask yourself

what is it exactly? Sexual harassment can consist of; suggestive gestures, looks, comments, touching, pinching, or grabbing, being leaned over or cornered, sexual notes or pictures, and/or being pressured or forced to do something sexual.

In a recent poll of teenage girls conducted by Seventeen magazine, 89% say they have been sexually harassed; 40% of these say it happens to them every day.

So what's the big deal? Who cares? Why make a big issue over it? First of all, it is against the law, though it may be hard to prove and convict someone for it. Second, it hurts the victims physically and emotionally. It lowers their selfesteem, can make them feel dirty or as if they've done something wrong. And third, whatever happened to the right to pursue happiness? Happiness cannot be found by con-

stant sexual pressures from a creep. Nobody has the right to take away another one's happiness.

Why do the harassers do it? One interviewed a victim felt "he (the harasser) did it for a cheap thrill." She also stated she would never harass someone because she has morals. An interviewed male thinks "guys don't know how else to express themselves." He also stated "most girls like it." However, all females interviewed at CHS said they did not like it. There seems to be a lot of mixed feelings floating around CHS on the subject.

Mr. LaFave, CHS guidance counselor, feels "sexual harassment exists everywhere." He thinks that if guys and girls had the chance to sit down and talk to each other, ask each other what bothers them, and what doesn't, the problem could be helped. He also said if a victim came to him he would

weigh the situation and take it only as far as the victim wanted. Many CHS students felt that the school had no control over harassment, couldn't do any thing about it, especially since victims are too scared or embarassed to tell.

The point is, if it does happen to you or somebody else, report it. Even if this only means telling a friend or parent. By making people aware you are making them less likely to harass orhwea, and more likely to report it to authorities if it happens to them.

Sexual harassment is not an exaggeration, it doesn't only happen to women, and it won't fade away until every single person on earth understands it. The lae needs to take off the blindfold and deal with it seriously. Until this happens, keep fighting and continue your pursuit of happiness.

#### Colby High Schools Sexual Harassment Policy

The School District of Colby shall maintain a learning and working environment that is free from sexual harassment. Both males and females can be victims or perpetrators of sexual harassment.

No employee, school board member or student shall be subjected to sexual harassment.

Disciplinary action against an employee should be in accordance with applicable administrative rules and collective bargaining agreement.

The definition of sexual harassment is unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature. More specifically sexual harassment is, but is not limitied to

A) lewd or sexually sug-

gestive comments

B) unwelcome touching

C) sexually explicit language or jokes

D) sexually suggestive objects or pictures

E) the threat or insinuation that the lack of sexual submission will adversely affect the victims job, grades, etc.

REPORTING PROCEDURE
Any employee, or student, who experience sexual harassment should file a written report of said incident(s) to their building principal/supervisor, unless the alleged offender is the building principal/supervisor. The building principal/supervisor must immediatly inform the superintendent of schools about the alleged harassment. A copy of the written report of said incident shall

be forwarded to the superintedent immediately. The building principal/supervisor will fully investigate the complaint, notify the person who has been accused of harassment and submit a report of the results of the investigation to all parties and the superintendent of schools within ten (10) working days of the complaint. The building principal/supervisor may exercise discretionary authority to discipline the employee or student involved if satisfied that the evidence as presented warrants disciplinary action. If the alleged offender is building principal/supervisor, the victim should file a written report with the superintendent of schools. the superintendent will conduct the investigation according to the same time

line.

If the complainant is not satisfied with the disposition of the case by the building principal/supervisior, he/she may issue a written appeal to the superintendent of schools indicating the nature of the disagreement with the report. The superintendent of school shall review the matter with the appropriate parties and provide a response to the appeal within twenty (20) working days.

If the complainant is not satisfied with the disposition of the case by the superintendent, he/she may request a hearing with the School District of Colby Board of Education. The board will hear evidence regarding the matter and take appropriate action to resolve the matter as


soon as possible.



The Connection is a hot new group Mrs. Guy and Mr. Hensler started last year. She attended a workshop about Natural Peer Helpers and thought Colby could benefit from such a program. The Natural Peer Helpers program's purpose is to give students someone on their own level to talk to. Peer Helpers are trained to help students explore and solve their problems. They also form a Connection between students who need help and professional sources of help. This is where Colby members got their name "The Connection" from. According to Mr. Rob Henseler, co-advisor, Natural Peer Helper Organizations are common in Wisconsin schools. They were formed because many students are uncomfortable going to adults for help, but their peers don't always know how to help. The Peer Helpers are trained to identify problems, help students explore their alternatives, and give them support when speaking to adults about their problems. Connection members are chosen by their peers. Each student is asked to nominate three people they're comfortable talking to. The person from each class who gets the most nominations is then asked to be a Connection member

Connection activities go beyond just talking to troubled students. They help out at the elementary in classrooms, on the playground, with study groups, and with the DARE program. They also host the Spring Fling, a dance for the Junior and Senior High. They also provide tutoring programs at the Junior and Senior High levels. 



Science is a challenge for most students. They can learn something new every day because science is always changing. For most students disection is the most interesting thing of the year. But for others they can't stand the smell of the formaldehyde used to preserve the object of disection. Student Erin Luchterhand liked to disect. She held the scalpel while her partner took notes.

The two science teachers at Colby High School are Mrs. Rubisch and Mr. Hansen. Mrs. Rubisch didn't decide to teach science until she was in college. She feels that "science is a challenge." This year Mrs. Rubisch wants to improve her teaching methods and to have more hands on labs.

When Mr. Hansen was enrolled in college he really wasn't sure if he wanted to teach science. 

#### Lesson 2



Mr. MacSwain's knee had given out and Mr Braun was working on helping him get it set so he could finish the walk. There was thunder and lightning off in the distance and Mr. MacSwain expressed a concern that he hoped the storm would hold off until they completed the walk. #### Lesson 3

Now, your journey takes you on a path that gois in a different direction, a path that now separates us. That separation means that life will never be the same for me and all who were blessed to know you. our loss is immense. In one sense, the world is a little darker now, because the flame of love has been extinguished in your life. Bet mabe you're teaching us that a candle can only provide light when it's lit, and burning, and melting away. So, in another sense, you've made the world a much brighter place because of the countless flames of love you ignited by touching the lives of others.

Mr. Braun helped us to set goals and to reach for those same goals. He taught beyond the classroom and into the real world. He enlightened us and shared many of his experiences so that we could make the right decisions in life. On behalf of the entire student body of Colby High School we extend our deepest sympathy. 








Lower Right: The concentration needed for Track and Field events is shown here by Scott Hopperditzel as


